## Parish Council News

- Lincolnshire County Council (LCC) completed erecting safety signs in the parish. A Give Way sign near to the Anglian Water sub-station was erected as well as Beware Horses signs at Ings Lane and on the Main Road north of the parish.
- The Archer Survey results have been received. The technical data recording equipment was located on a lamp Post outside Number 1, Chapel Close which was installed for a full week. An average of 854 vehicles travelled through the survey area. The weekend data showed a lower volume of vehicles travelling through the village.

The average speed of vehicles was 28.1 mph in a 30-mph limit. The speed data showed evidence that some vehicles were exceeding the speed limit at a speed that would make the drivers liable to action or prosecution by the Police.

There had been no recorded collisions involving personal injury for the last 3-year period up to a data date of 30<sup>th</sup> April 2022. Highways engineers within the Road Safety Partnership have assessed the area and concluded that no engineering casualty reduction measures were identified.

- The Parish Council had one other recent resignation. Don Wiltshire who was elected Chair last May resigned in July. Cllr Gillian Pollard has been elected Chair and Cllr Ian Appleby takes on the Vice Chair.
- The External Auditors have now certified completing their review of the Annual Governance and Accounting Returns for Financial Year 2021/22.
- You will have noticed that this issue of the newsletter now contains adverts from local trades. The Council agreed the advertising terms for any tradespeople to advertise on the quarterly Parish Council newsletter as below.



# The Covenham St Bartholomew Heritage Trust

Thank you for supporting St Bart's.

The new transept roof was only the start of the refurbishment programme and it was a steep learning curve! Looking back on it, about fifty people were involved within the project, it seems a lot but included surveyors, architects, roofers, environmental ecologists, Historic England, tutors, students, scaffolders, ELDC and the Bat Conservation Trust and that is not a complete list!

As we look forward to the next stage of restoration we want to use the church as much as we possibly can; obviously we are restricted to daylight hours and the warmer months but that is so much better than not having purpose until we have replaced the roof, installed facilities and switched the lights on.

Back in the late seventies St. Bart's was under threat of demolition. Later there was a plan to ship St. Bart's off to the USA! Fortunately, a few stepped up and put this building with over a thousand years of history associated with it into trust for the benefit of the nation.

There are many facets to the work required to this building which has a fascinating history and a promising future.

Externally the churchyard is strimmed a few times each year and wild flowers are gradually returning. We have barn owls regularly using the tower as a roost and have recorded deer and badgers using the churchyard. The large annual job is collecting the leaf drop. Leaf compost is then left to compost down at the back of the church and it's there for anyone to use.

The latest annual report is attached if you would like to read it. In a nutshell, we are now planning to apply for funding for the next stage in restoring the church. We need to discover the exact condition of the rest of the building other than the south transept – i.e. walls, timbers, floors, drainage and what remains of the roof. However, being able to start the restoration which will need to follow, we know we will have to raise large amounts of money including applying for grants to fund it and would like as much help and as many ideas as possible to do this.

We need those with administrative as well as practical skills in the following areas:

VAT returns Gift Aid
Administration Fund Raising
Event Organisation Social Media

Painting Lime mortar application

Slate repairs Cleaning (interior and exterior)

Cleaning materials and sponsorships

Co-ordinating the Friends of Covenham St Bartholomew Church

Gardening (we have a good gang of volunteers but more are welcome)

Contributors - for example native wildflower seed

# Gardeners Corner... By *Angela Aylett*

As the sunsets draw forward and the autumn starts to dress herself for the coming season, donning her most vibrant hues, she has swept into our streets and woodlands with a humble boldness that invites the eye to see more than they otherwise might. The autumn takes her pirouette, her sweet turn on the stage all around, and we are so blessed to be given such beauty.

Some autumn tasks...

### Tidy up borders:

- Dig up annuals, plant up winter annuals.
- Cut back faded perennial. But don't be too tidy, attractive seed heads are great for wildlife.
- Spread a nice thick layer of compost on your borders. Don't worry about digging in, the worms will do that job over the winter.

#### Lawns:

- Remove thatch and moss using a rake or with a scarifier (you may need to use a moss killer if you have lots of moss)
- Brush in a sandy top dressing, followed by an application of autumn feed.
- Autumn is a great time to sow lawn seed or lay new turf.

### And:

- Make leaf mould: choose a sheltered spot and make a wire mesh frame for your leaves. Add the leaves sprinkle with water and leave. If you create a little gap at the bottom of the box a hedgehog might make a winter home there.
- If you have Dahlias, wait until the frost gets the foliage and then lift and store over winter.
- Net your ponds: decomposing leaves turn your pond water foul and block filters.
- Start feeding the birds and regularly clean their feeders.
