Parish Council News

- *Welcome*: Angela Aylett was unanimously voted in as a newly coopted parish councillor at the meeting held last November. Angela moved to Covenham St Bartholomew in June 2021 from Herefordshire. She has set up her garden services and also serves as a committee member of Covenham Village Volunteers.
- *Farewell*. The Parish Council gave their thanks to Alyson Wiltshire who resigned from the Parish Council in late September due to work commitments.
- All parish, town and district council seats are up for election on 4th May 2023. The publication of election notices will be issued by the District Council election teams for display in all parishes by Monday 27th March 2023 (at the latest) and nomination papers for all candidates will need to be submitted by 4th April 2023. All those voting at polling stations are now required to show a photo ID to cast their vote.
- The Parish Council continues to share the Mobile Speed Sign equipment with three other neighbouring parishes. Covenham has the equipment for January and February2023 and again for September and October 2023.
- The Parish Council has agreed its budget for Financial Year 2023/24.
 A Precept requirement of £8,934 has been submitted to East Lindsey District Council. Breakdown of the budget is available to view on the website under the November 2022 Parish Council minutes. The table below shows the precept per property band for the full year as well as the weekly equivalent.

The Parish Rooms

Further refurbishments have been done to improve the Parish Rooms.

- New LED lighting panels have been installed which has remarkably brightened the Main Hall.
- The kitchen is now equipped with new glasses, cutlery and crockery which will cater for 40 guests.

The Parish Council thanked ELDC Ward Member Cllr Edward Mossop for the £250 from his Councillors' Community Grant which will be used to buy black-out curtains for the two big windows in the Main Hall which will block any draughts coming through, make the room warmer and allow the heating to be more efficient and effective.

With the ELDC headquarters move from Manby to Horncastle, the Parish Council managed to acquire some furniture no longer required. It is hoped that the Parish Council will also secure chairs previously used in the council chambers which are more comfortable than the plastic chairs currently in use.

Further grant funding opportunities continue to be pursued. The Parish Clerk has submitted an application to fund a new front door and a back door. The Council will also be looking for other funding to address penetrating dampness on the wall caused by rain penetration.

The Parish Rooms are now getting regular bookings and it is hoped that more people and groups will use the facilities for both private and commercial functions.

From your District Councillor......

The cold still mornings of mid-January have brought stunning early sunrises across The Marsh. The description of weather and its impact on the landscape bring to mind a book that I was given for Christmas by my son which I am reading at the moment. Edge of England – Landfall in Lincolnshire is written by Derek Turner, born in Ireland now resident in Theddlethorpe. It is a fascinating and wonderfully researched study of our much neglected county. It draws out the rich history, its famous people, folklore and all that is distinctive about Lincolnshire. It's a must read for all Yellowbellies and those 'outeners' who now live in our community. I thoroughly recommend it.

A major milestone in the history of East Lindsey District Council begins this year with the opening of its new headquarters in Horncastle, imaginatively called 'The Hub'. This brings to a close over fifty years of occupancy at Tedder Hall, Manby. The former RAF College has been sold to part-fund the new building. I and a number of colleagues were dismayed to see skips containing equipment that could be re-purposed and given to Parish Councils and voluntary groups and so we arranged for contact to be made and a number of organisations, including the Parish Room at Covenham have benefitted from this. The new offices are open-plan and shared with Boston College who will be running courses from part of the building bringing in revenue to the Council. The Council's Customer Contact phone number is unchanged: 01507 601111 and the address is The Hub, Mareham Road, Horncastle, LN9 6PH. All council meetings will now take place there.

Some of my Council work in the past few months has been to chair a review group of Councillors from across the three District Councils of East Lindsey, Boston and South Holland. All three now share the same Chief Executive and Senior Management Team. The main driver for this partnership is to save money and to be able to lobby central Government more effectively as a group of three Councils. One of the key pressures that is common to all three partners is the way in which money is raised to fund our Inland Drainage Boards. We all are geographically low-lying and under threat from flooding were it not for the sterling work of the Drainage Board. Whether we achieve success at Whitehall on this remains to be seen but never has it been more urgent to safeguard our communities from the misery of flooded homes.

Lindsey Marsh Drainage Board (LMDB) is the local board responsible for maintenance of some of the waterways to the east of Covenham. The responsibility is shared with The Environment Agency who manage and maintain the larger ones such as Louth Canal and Poulton Drain which runs through the village. LMDB are also responsible for the small pumping station behind St Mary's that takes surplus water from the village pumping it into Poulton Drain. Last year, a new electrical control panel and two new pumps were installed and commissioned in September. Good news for Covenham but as a board member on LMDB, I will continually ask that the Environment Agency step up to their responsibilities in properly maintaining and clearing their waterways.

Finally, a reminder that there are Parish and District Council elections this year (4th May 2023). If you intend to vote in person, then you will be required to produce Photo ID such as a Passport or Driving Licence in order to cast your vote.

Well, that's enough 'wodds an' doggerybaw' from me! All the best,

Lincolnshire County Council News

The County Council have set up the Louth Transport Board. This board includes local county councillors, East Lindsey District councillors and the Mayor of Louth town council. The Active Travel Scheme continues to be the main issue being discussed. Many residents living in Covenham have contacted me about this. I will continue to make sure that views of residents are represented on the transport board.

There's going to be a new Louth Children's home that will be located behind the Riverhead Theatre, on the site of the former Pilgrim School. The home is expected to be completed in late summer 2023, with the first residents arriving in autumn 2023. This new home will provide high-quality facilities for children in care and will mean that fewer children will need to be placed in homes outside the county. This will ensure that these children remain close to their local community and existing support networks, leading to better outcomes for them. 
Please do come along and join us this year everyone is always welcome, but if you could just let us know by the Sunday before the meal it would help us to know how many to cater for.

The Covenham St Bartholomew Heritage Trust

Some really good news, Historic England, under the Repair Grants for Heritage at Risk scheme have offered us £25,750 for us to take St. Bartholomew's to the next stage of refurbishment as the result of a successful application. We are extremely pleased (to say the least) and extremely grateful to all that have helped to reach this next step.

This funding is to complete a detailed survey with the intention of rolling out to further conservation work. We will now start looking to appoint a Lead Professional, a suitably qualified and experienced structural engineer. Their role will be the management and delivery of a report upon the condition and make conservative recommendations for the repair of:

- 1) the nave roof structure including concealed beam ends and joints;
- 2) the chancel roof structure including concealed timber bearings (both north and

south sides);

- 3) the structural timbers of the bell tower;
- 4) the nave floor; and
- 5) foundations in locations of structural movement;

This will require a range of skills including an archaeologist and ecologist to compliment the more obvious building conservation related skills. We will keep you all informed on progress in the new year.

One aspect of conservation that we are pursuing concurrently is the future of the rood screen that has been stored in the church for many years. It, too, requires a survey. It is early days but the screen needs to be accurately drawn and/or scanned. The paint needs to be investigated as there maybe gold, blue and red detailing under the black paint. Such paint would require a conservator to work on it, the screen structure to be repaired at erected, hopefully, at the west end of the nave. Again, we will have more information to share on this over the coming months.

If anyone would like to get involved, in any capacity, with the conservation of St Bartholomew's please get in touch. Don't think because you have never been involved in something like this there isn't much you can offer as nothing could be further from the truth. It is a learning process from day one, lots of professionals out there give us advice and your knowledge grows. Conservation, fundraising, archaeology, history, gardening, event management, ecology, building, carpentry, cleaning and administration. All of these disciplines and more make up a successful team so please join in, we would be pleased to see you.
